# **RHA Board** & Committee News:

Board of Directors: by Charlie Marts, Board President From the March 13 RHA Board Meeting: -- Five residents connected via Zoom.

-- Both the "Electric Vehicle Charging Stations" and "TH Trash and Garbage Collection" policy resolutions have been adopted and are posted at RHA-homes.org/governing-documents.

-- The DH trash resolution also needs updating.

-- The board is considering the effect the TH trash collection cost increases will have on the budget.

-- TH Drainage and Erosion -- the board is looking into contacting several of the companies on the list from the Northern Virginia Soil & Water Conservation District for assistance.

-- The board is working with Battlefield Towing to provide a proposal and schedule for painting "No Parking" lanes.

-- Sidewalks -- the board is planning on doing a community walkthrough to identify issues with RHA sidewalks.

-- The board will begin work in updating the resident Rules and Policies handbook.

RHA website -- the board is considering establishing a committee to maintain and update it.

-- The board agreed to get a quote for the annual DH large item pickup.

Fairfax County is working on establishing construction easements and acquiring land rights for the Metro Walk/Bike Path through RHA.




The next ACC meeting will be Tuesday, April 6 at 7pm via Zoom.

#### Street Ambassadors:

Does your household **recycle**? Does your household **upcycle**? If yes to either question, thank you for your contribution. <u>Please recycle, upcycle, reuse, and reduce.</u> Did you know: <u>Plastic bags</u> – Don't recycle because these get tangled in recycling equipment and must be removed by manual labor slowing down the recycling process.

<u>Styrofoam anything and plastic to-go containers</u> - Don't recycle. Clean and reuse if you can, especially those packaging peanuts.

<u>Medicines</u> - Don't recycle or throw in regular trash. Our police station and some local pharmacies provide a secure drop box for safe disposal of expired or unused medicine. Call your pharmacy first to see if they are participating.

<u>Glass</u> - Can't recycle curbside with other recyclables. Folks can take glass products to a dumpster located at the intersection of Sterling Road (Rt 606) and Rock Hill Road at the Herndon Public Works facility. Just insert the jars and bottles by hand into the small rubber holes at the side of the dumpster. (See photo)



All glass collected in the purple bins is crushed and used for various county construction projects.

<u>Animal waste and dirty diapers</u> – Don't recycle. Please bag and throw it into regular trash.

Become familiar with <u>the I-66 Transfer Station and the I-95 Land-fill Complex.</u> They are currently providing free wood mulch. You must provide your own containers/bags.

*note:* Mulch is also available free at Baron Cameron Park (corner of Baron Cameron Ave and Wiehle Ave.

<u>Best practices for recycling</u> may be confusing and challenging so check out the local website:

www.fairfaxcounty.gov/publicworks/recycling-trash/recycle. Fill in the "type an item at Trash-What Goes Where?" For example, I typed in "shredded paper". Answer: Don't Recycle. What?? Why?? Because it flies, floats and makes a mess in the residential recycling equipment. What to do with it? Some ideas: Use for your pet's bedding or compost pile or arts/crafts.

Do you occasionally have a river in your backyard?

Are you sick of mud getting tracked into the house?

Did you know there are native perennial plants that are easy to grow and help control rainwater runoff? Planting a few of these around our yard has made a significant difference. When the rain comes there is no more river and little to no mud.

This is a great alternative to paying thousands of dollars for landscapers or hiring a professional to install a French drain or underground drainpipe. Native plants are also naturally beautiful and good for the earth.

Here is a list of native perennial plants that you should consider planting.

-- The <u>Southern Blue</u> <u>Flag Iris</u> worked best for us. It grows to 2 feet, and requires full sun to bloom, but if in full shade the plant will still capture rainwater runoff but it may not bloom.

# -- Dwarf Crested Iris

grows from 4-16 inches, and is best in shade. It is a great woodland ground cover for areas you don't want to weed.

-- <u>Bog Rosemary</u>, requires full sun and grows 8-36 inches. This plant really does require full sun so we don't have it in our yard but has grown well in many of our friends' yards.

-- <u>Swamp Milkweed</u>, full sun to part shade, 2-5 feet, host plant for monarch butterfly.

-- <u>Great Blue Lobelia</u>, full sun, 2-3 feet, perennial but divide every two years.

-- <u>Woodland Phlox (or any</u> native Phlox), 5-18 inches, attracts butterflies and hummingbirds.

-- <u>Jack in the Pulpit</u>, shade, 1-3 feet, very unique plant.

-- <u>Common Wild Ginger</u>, shade, 4-8 inches, host plant for swallowtail butterfly.

-- <u>Coral Honeysuckle</u>, full sun to part shade, 3-20 feet (vine), beautiful reliable blooms.



-- <u>American Wisteria</u>, full sun to shade, 25-30 feet (vine), not to be confused with the invasive Chinese and Japanese wisteria varieties!

-- Any native <u>sedge</u> is a good alternative where rainwater runoff kills normal grass, we like Pennsylvania Sedge

Support your new plants by surrounding them with *free leaf mulch* from the dump (aka the I-66 Transfer Station), 4618 West Ox Rd. Fairfax, VA 22030; alternatively, the dump also has *free normal mulch* as well. You may find a piece of trash in the mulch from time to time, but overall, the mulch is great and you cannot beat the price. We have been using it for years and some of our gardening friends have been using it for decades. You do have to haul it yourself, so bring a shovel and, if you don't have a truck, bring some plastic bins.
